Richard Cooke, the Rector, writes:

My Mum was a fairly regular church-goer, but one thing she couldn't stand was the cross. She found the idea repellent that God the Father sent Jesus, his son, to suffer and to die. 'No-one could do that to their child' she said. She really disliked pictures of the crucifixion – 'I can't stand all that blood' she said. But something changed in the last few months of her life. She had been ill with cancer for a while, and in mid-February she lapsed into unconsciousness, and we were called to her bedside as a family to say goodbye. Yet, remarkably, she rallied and recovered for four more months of Spring and early Summer. In that time she wasn't able to do much more than sit in bed, but she sketched flowers as she did so, and drew a card for Easter. To my surprise she drew a cross, but it was an empty one, surrounded by signs of Spring, and on it were the words 'He is Risen.'

The cross sits at the heart of Christian faith and you can find examples of it in all kinds of places – in windows, on altars, in churchyards, and even our church buildings are, mostly, designed in the shape of a cross. The point of the cross is not the blood or suffering of Jesus, but the way it shows the kind of love God has for the world – a love so strong that God would give himself for the sake of his world. This is love so powerful that, Christians believe, it could even conquer death. I think that is what my Mum realised in those last months, and the Easter card (now in a small frame) still sits in my study. This Lent, which begins on 14th February this year, a day when

This Lent, which begins on 14th February this year, a day when we celebrate love for St Valentine as well as Ash Wednesday, in the church services we shall be looking at some paintings and Bible passages about the cross in a series called 'Bystanders at the Cross'. Each week's theme will be on the 'Ilmington Downs and Stour Valley Churches' website – do have a look. Shipston Deanery also has a series on 'Perspectives on the Cross' with a variety of speakers on Tuesday afternoons at 2.30pm in Lent – details also on the website – and the first is at St Mary's, Tysoe on 20 February with Ruth Worsley, who is currently our acting Bishop.

Being Realistic about Church Costs

People often assume that the Church of England receives a Government subsidy. In medieval times local churches were supported by a tenth part of produce from the land (a 'tithe' again) – in effect a local tax. This system had collapsed by the early 1800s and was finally abolished in 1936, when the Government agreed to pay a lump sum to the Church to end the liability. Since then around 75% of Church costs have had to be met through personal giving. The remaining £25% comes from the Church Commissioners, an independent charitable body that provides funding for new initiatives and low-income communities, and for bishops and cathedrals, but not, usually, for ordinary parishes.

The aim is that each group of churches should pay for the cost of mission and ministry in its own area. These costs basically fall into two categories: buildings and staff. Here is a very rough estimated guide to what I expect the costs in each category to be for our six churches in 2024. (Tredington and Darlingscott are one parish, so their figures have been merged.)

The cost of buildings is fairly straightforward, but as we have 6

churches varying between 150 and over 1000 years old, their upkeep is not cheap. Our PCCs have been working hard to keep these costs down (there have been significant recent savings in some cases by shopping around for better insurance deals, for example). All of our buildings are valued by their local communities, and I am committed to keeping them open and available to be oases of calm and peace in an increasingly busy and frantic world. We need these still places.

The actual cost of staff for our group of churches (one full-time Rector, plus a part-time Associate, with two clergy houses) is reckoned to be $\pounds72,000$ per year. This figure includes the cost of pension and house, and a significant contribution to training future clergy – the actual stipend paid is about $\pounds27,000$. You'll see from the table that, at the moment, we are not able to meet our full staff costs by some margin, as we are only able to contribute $\pounds55,000$. This means we are being subsidised by other churches across Coventry and Warwickshire.

Therefore in the next magazine I'll be including some information about how you can support your local church financially if you would like to do so. Expanding the range of people who give a regular monthly amount, even if it is small, could transform our finances. In the meantime, do get in touch if you'd like to know more. Nature Notes January 2024

Flowers are generally a traditional gift for St Valentine's Day, especially the red rose. In Victorian times, flowers had different meanings. Due to strict Victorian etiquette flowers were primarily used to deliver messages that couldn't be spoken aloud so learning their meaning meant that nearly all Victorian homes had, alongside the Bible, guidebooks for deciphering the "language," definitions could vary! Using this "language" flowers could be used to answer "yes" or "no" questions. Flowers given with the right hand meant "yes", flowers given with the left hand meant "no". Red tulips were a declaration of love, violets from your loved one declared that he would be faithful to you, forget-me-nots were sent to a loved one who was moving away. Irises meant that a message had been sent and Canterbury bells that the message had been received to name just a few! *Gill*


